Lila the tiger has been living a dismal life at the Waccatee Zoological Farm in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina for years. She is frequently seen pacing back and forth in her small enclosure, and now she's suffering from an apparent medical condition that has left her almost completely bald. Given her declining physical condition, it appears Lila isn't receiving adequate veterinary care. Lila is just one of many animals at the zoo suffering from poor living conditions and improper care. Lila needs to be transferred immediately to an accredited sanctuary where she can receive expert care and appropriate treatment.



Dear Ms. Futrell,
